FROM THE DESK OF PASTOR RICHARD

HIGH SCHOOL, CRACKER BARREL, AND LIFE

When you have worked with high school students long enough you begin to notice that some things remain constant regardless of the group or generation. For instance. High school boys generally begin ninth grade as lovable knuckleheads. They don't generally mean any harm but due to an over-abundance of confidence mixed with a severe lack of common sense (both side effects of testosterone poisoning) they do some of the dumbest things imaginable. Literally, if a stupid thought pops into their heads odds are they will attempt it. Conversely, another constant is that no matter how impulsive these ninth graders may be you always find yourself amazed at how much they have grown and matured by the time they reach twelfth grade.

On the other hand, girls enter ninth grade having survived the social obstacle course that is middle school. They want to put the drama behind them and start high school as mature young women. Unfortunately, that drama usually catches up to them by the second week of school. However, by the time they reach twelfth grade they have usually become the amazing young woman they dreamed of being four years ago.

This process is ironically both the greatest joy and most difficult challenge of working with teenagers. You have the joy of watching them evolve from awkward adolescents into young adults but just as you see them begin to realize their potential you have to let them go. Thus, I find this time of year the most bittersweet time of the year.

At the end of Summer every year students tell me of their plans for the future whether it's going to college or beginning a career they always assure me they'll be back. "We'll come to visit on weekends and holidays". "It's only four years, after that we'll be back in Frederick and everything will be the same". This leads me to a final constant you learn in working with teenagers, whether they realize it or not they are moving on and things will never be the same. This is entirely as it should be but letting go is not easy and it always leaves me feeling a little blue. As I feel this sadness I harken back to word of advice someone gave me a few years ago that helped me keep a proper perspective in regard to the high school experience.

Imagine that life is like a road trip you have a destination in mind but it's going to take you a while to get there. If life is the journey, then high school is a little like Cracker Barrel. Most people love Cracker Barrel, on a long drive Cracker Barrel is wonderful respite you can stop and use the rest room, spend a little time playing checkers or that triangle game with the golf tees. You can eat a meal that is more substantial than fast food and pick up some snacks and distractions for the journey ahead.

Cracker Barrel, however, is not your destination. It won't be long before your done with checkers and have figured out that little triangle game. Although the food is decent it will soon grow old and it isn't long before you're ready to resume your journey. A constant of any journey is you leave things behind you. To all of my students beginning college this week or moving on to careers, it's time to put high school in your rearview mirror and continue your journey. Safe travels.
