soon enough, but for the time being, everything was good. The Gospel was preached with great success. It was easy. Too easy. The response Paul received from his Pentecost sermon didn't meet with easy success. It didn't meet with difficult success. It wasn't successful at all. 3,000 converts? There wasn't a single one. They wanted to kill him. There have been a few sermons after which my wife wanted to kill me, but other than that I've never had such a spectacular failure as Paul did that day. It only got worse. Paul gets thrown in prison and he's a prisoner throughout the rest of the book. There's a plot to assassinate him while he's a Roman prisoner. Oh, and he gets shipwrecked and almost dies. I'm sorry, but that's a really bad sermon. Okay, not really. It was a good sermon. In fact, part of it was given to him directly through Jesus. Which, ahem, was the part that made the crowd pick up rocks. (If Pam ever wants to kill me again after a sermon-and it will-happen, I'm going to use the "but-Jesus-told-me-to" defense. I'm sure it will work.) But of the two sermons, I'd rather have the response Peter got. I'd probably get a book deal, go on the Christian speakers' circuit, start a podcast that would go viral, and maybe even get interviewed by Colbert on T.V. I'm more likely to get Paul's response, but that's not very likely. My sermons may not be great, but they're safe. Law-abiding. Perfectly fine. This is not the first time that things didn't go as well with Paul as they did the first time. The first time he was thrown in prison he and Silas sang hymns all night long and God caused an earthquake that shook the prison doors open. The next time he was in prison there was no earthquake, no angel, no nothing. He rotted in prison for three years. Because earthquakes are rare, miracles by definition unlikely, and God will not be reduced to a formula. Because sometimes sermons are timely and well-received, and sometimes they are not, and neither have anything really to do with the speaker and his preparation or skill. The Wind blows where it will, and will not be contained or controlled. But here's Luke's point: the Gospel advances anyway. It can't be contained, controlled, or imprisoned. As Paul makes his way under guard from Jerusalem to Rome, he proclaims the Gospel and it advances. Even when shipwrecked he healed people, everyone was astonished, and the Gospel was advanced. And that seems to be the point of Acts. The Gospel advances, against all opposition, as long as we are not deterred, as long as we stay faithful. Because in the end, God gets what he wants. He will not be deterred. He will always be faithful. And the Gospel always advances.

FROM THE DESK OF PASTOR LARRY

Last week's article showed that there are actually two Pentecost stories in Acts, the one we're all familiar with in chapter 2 and the one in chapters 21-23 that's

(By "echo" I mean a story that is not exactly like the original but has enough elements to invoke it in the reader's mind. The biblical writers do this *a lot*.) Besides both occurring at Pentecost, the stories share the elements of people hearing an apostle speak their own language in a surprising way, the hearers misunderstanding what is going on, followed by an address by the apostles. That's enough to provide the echo; what happens next is the point Luke is

In chapter 2, Peter's sermon results in an overwhelming response—over 3,000 new believers in Jesus as the Messiah, the founding of the first church which is characterized by extreme generosity such that no believer withheld anything from the community but everyone shared everything equally.

Significantly, there is no mention of any opposition. No mention that anyone in the Temple leadership noticed anything threatening happening. That would come
