We're Open

Actually, FBC has been open for worship since last summer, but with the pandemic still raging and various restrictions on capacity, congregational singing, and interpersonal contact, as well as mask and distancing requirements, most people have chosen to "attend" worship and Bible study remotely.

As more and more people have received the COVID-19 vaccine we have been seeing people slowly returning to worship. It's been fun to see people in person that for the last year we have only seen on a computer screen or not at all!

Now that Gov. Hogan has lifted the indoor capacity restrictions, we can begin to envision returning to some semblance of regular church life. Many of our adult Bible Study classes are planning to resume meeting at the church in the next few weeks, and as they return then our children's classes will as well.

Attendance at our 10:00 a.m. worship service has crept up into the fifties, and as more people return we will keep a close watch on attendance and return to our twoservice schedule when numbers warrant. Though our numbers have been few and fellowship has been limited, it has been good for people from both services to worship together the last year.

If you are fully vaccinated we encourage you to come back to worship as soon as you are comfortable. We caution those who haven't been vaccinated to consider, for your own protection, waiting until Maryland has reached "herd immunity" before returning.

I am beyond happy to report that financially we have actually flourished, due in part to reduced expenses but also to the continued faithfulness of the FBC family. Many people have been taking advantage of our online giving platform or that of their bank, and others have faithfully mailed their contributions to the office.

In addition, we have had up to four congregations in addition to ours using our facility for worship, and along with other rentals from basketball teams our Worship Center is used all day every day. Finally, we were able to receive grants through the Payroll Protection Program which boosted our income and that of Little Lights Child Development Center.

Thus, we were able to finish 2020 over \$123,000 in the black! So far in 2021 we are \$8,290.40 under expenses, with over \$182,000 in our General Fund.

Thank you for your faithfulness! We look forward to seeing more and more of you in the weeks to come!

THE LINARES FAMILY

A few months ago, Pastor Larry received an email from a man named Jose Linares, who told of his connection with First Baptist when he and his family came to America as refugees from Cuba after Castro took over. His family's story is below.

Easter morning the Linares family placed a beautiful floral arrangement in the worship center in appreciation of FBC and in memory of their parents, Onelia and Manuel Linares.

In 1963 The First Baptist Church of Frederick sponsored a Cuban Family. My name is Jose Linares, and I am the youngest member of that family. This short narrative is that story.

"They've just arrived!" said Rev. Woodward, in his soft gentle voice, as he introduced us to a few neighbors at 211 Dill avenue on that warm summer day in June 1963. That house was to be our new temporary home while we found work, registered for school, and settled in Frederick, our new hometown.

My older brother and I had arrived at Miami airport in October of 1961. He was 16, I was 11, and we had no family in Florida waiting for us. Our parents and our sister would arrive in June of 1962. That story of emotional separation is for another time. What mattered most to us then is that we were reunited. Our parents, Manuel and Onelia, had sacrificed everything for us!

By the spring of 1963 South Florida had been overwhelmed with asylum seeking refugees fleeing Castro's Cuba. As such, steady employment was nonexistent and all rental properties were filled beyond capacity. All of us worked at whatever was available. My sister cleaned houses from time to time and I sold newspapers on the street corners. My mom stretched every meal as much as possible and at times earned a few dollars sewing for others. My father and brother worked as field hands picking pole beans in Homestead, Florida. With summer arriving the harvesting season was ending and with it two sources of our income.

To relieve economic pressures in South Florida the US Department of Health Education and Welfare asked other communities around the country to sponsor Cuban families. Many communities responded including The First Baptist Church of Frederick. On June 5th, 1963 we boarded the airplane that took us to Frederick. Externally the house at 211 was like most houses are today on Dill Avenue. I know this because I have since been back a few times and have also visited virtually using "Google Street View," a marvelous innovation! The church used the living room for Sunday overflow services, but other than that the house was totally at our disposal until we got on our feet. All rooms had been fully furnished while the refrigerator was filled with fresh provisions, and the pantry was fully stocked! I fell in love with Cocoa Krispies!

LINARES FAMILY TODAY

Opportunities have since taken us to other states and I am now retired and living in Massachusetts. My sister and brother are also retired and living in Florida, and Georgia, respectively. From time to time, we gather and remember our wonderful experiences in our adopted hometown, Frederick, and still consider ourselves a part of The First Baptist Church's congregation. Our parents passed on in 2001. Their grandchildren number seven and have started their own families. Three of those grandchildren were born in Frederick! They are all productive and contributing citizens of this great nation and work in accounting, computer technologies, education, and banking. Their grandparents' sacrifice lives on!

A few days after our arrival we were invited to dinner at the church. We were introduced to many members of the congregation and many questions about our family and our trip were asked. My brother and sister answered as best they could. English was a work in progress for us. After dinner Rev. Woodward said they had a surprise! As if a furnished home, even if temporary, and a pantry and refrigerator full of food was not enough! We were led to an adjacent room where the church community had donated every conceivable form of attire you could imagine, from dresses to shirts, suits, shoes and purses, winter boots and coats, and 'galoshes'...whatever those were! Those last few items, as you might guess, were a curiosity to us. We had never been exposed to 'real' winters or seen snow. "Take what you like, it's for you!", said Rev. Woodward. To this day, whenever I recount this story, and that includes while I am typing this note, I cannot help but get emotional at the compassion, generosity, and genuine kindness extended to us by your congregation.

It has been almost 60 years since the First Baptist Church extended a much needed helping hand to our family and in so doing opened the doors of opportunity. It is because of your congregation's compassion, generosity, and care for those in need that the Linares are established American families today.

With heartfelt gratitude and profound appreciation, we <u>thank</u> <u>you</u> for everything your congregation did for us during our time of need.

BOX PROJECTS

First Baptist plans to conduct several "box projects" per year to help Meals on Wheels respond to the needs of seniors. In August we will create "Pet Pouches" for senior's pets which will include dry and canned food, treats and small toys. Although seniors receive great love and companionship from their pets, it is often a struggle to feed them on a limited budget. MISSION PROJECT: SHOEBOXES FOR SENIORS

Imagine it's a snowy day, and the radio says that the roads are icy across the county. If you are a senior who is house bound, and who counts on regular deliveries from the Frederick County Meals on Wheels, you begin to wonder if the delivery will be made today. Your biggest concern is that there isn't much in the refrigerator to eat, and if the volunteer can't get up to your house to deliver a meal, what will you eat for the next day or so?

This is a serious problem for many seniors in Frederick County who depend upon Meals on Wheels to deliver nutritious and tasty food. However our church members are working hard to make sure that there is a solution.

In February members filled over 100 "Shoeboxes for Seniors" to be distributed through the Frederick Meals on Wheels. Each box contained "shelf-ready" food which could be used whenever a regular meal can't be delivered. Containing food such as crackers, peanut butter, dried fruits, soup, and small treats such as cocoa mix, cookies or granola bars, these boxes can be a real lifeline for many. In addition to helping during weather emergencies, these boxes will also be given to seniors who may be in immediate need of food due to homelessness or lack funds to purchase food until benefits are activated.

In addition to filling a box full of food, members also included a small note for encouragement to brighten the day for isolated seniors. Some boxes were even decorated with paint, ribbon, glitter or stickers to add a ray of sunshine to the box. One creative member even painted inspiring quotes on the boxes, encouraging seniors to look for hope during difficult times.

When the boxes were delivered to the Meals on Wheels office for distribution, the staff were surprised and thrilled to receive so many boxes. "These will be wonderful for our clients and will brighten their days to know that they are remembered," said Kitty Devilbliss, Director of Community Services at the Frederick County Senior Services Division.


MISSION PROJECT: BUNDLES OF JOY

During the month of May, First Baptist partnered with the Asian American Center of Frederick (AACF) for a new mission project, **BUNDLES OF JOY.** These boxes include critical baby essentials like sleepers, baby shampoo, washcloths, bibs, and socks to share with a new mother of limited means. We hope those that assembled a box remembered the joy and love they received from their own mothers while sharing that love with other new mothers. Each box will be distributed by the AACF to families who are seeking financial and educational assistance as they settle into a new life here in Frederick County. The boxes will remind the families that Jesus loved and valued little children, and that this community will welcome them.

The Church also accepted donations of disposable diapers for delivery to the AACF. The youth group also made 8 baby blankets for new mothers.

Prior to delivering the Bundle of Joy boxes to the AACF, they were sealed with stickers showcasing the beautiful mother baby artwork drawn by Diya Jha. Diya is a sophomore at Governor Thomas Johnson High School and a very active member of the youth group. She earned her Girl Scouts Gold award with the help of youth group volunteers for painting a room for the developmentally disabled young adults who attend the Pathways program in Frederick, Maryland. Diya loves every opportunity to volunteer and interact with the youth group. She is a taekwondo black belt instructor and teaches kids ages 4-14. Diya aspires to study computer science and business and also continue working with children and volunteering.





Our **Amazing Grace** class weathered the pandemic together. Some of us met weekly at Janet Willsie -Noffsinger's home, others connected via texting.

We shared Bible lessons together as well as our personal lives. We grew so much closer and praise God for keeping us safe. We prayed for others who contracted covid. CHILDREN'S MINISTRY

Children's Ministry has been offering activities for children since the beginning of the pandemic. Children's Ministry staff will continue to take temperatures of children participating in activities. Following the guidance of the Maryland Department of Health and Maryland State Department of Education, staff will continue to wear masks during Children's Ministry. Children over the age of 2 that can successfully wear a mask are strongly recommended to do so for activities in the building. As weather allows for activities to be outdoors and children can be distanced 6 feet, masks breaks will be allowed.

Little Lights Child Development Center (LLCDC) has been able to stay open throughout the pandemic. Last March, they were classified as an Essential Personnel Childcare facility.



2020 CENSUS

First Baptist Church stepped forward to help our community be counted in the Census 2020 by serving as a training site in August 2020 for over a week, hosting 400 Census field workers. During this period when all government buildings were closed during the pandemic the Census was desperate to find a local site large enough to train these workers. By providing our building for training these critical service workers, our members made certain that Frederick County would be accurately counted, thus bringing in millions of federal funds to support community services such as schools, roads, and senior services.

CHURCH BUILDING UPDATE

Even though the church was shut down for several months in 2020 and open at a limited capacity for nearly a year, maintenance had to continue on the church building and grounds. We were able to refinish the wood stairs and stage, replace soffets and gutters and added Gutter Guard, repair the roof behind the steeple, replace the old projectors with a new center projector in the worship center, and keep up with regular grounds keeping during the warmer months.

Current needs for the church grounds include a new shed as we have outgrown the current maintenance building. It currently is being used for the maintenance equipment plus a variety of miscellaneous storage. A second shed would hold the non-maintenance items like all Christmas Trail decorations and items that need "clean" storage such as extra upholstered chairs, etc. The cost will be approximately \$7,000 which includes both the building and the ground/foundation preparation. Currently we have received \$3100 in designated donations toward a new shed. THANK YOU ! Pl ease note that any donation amounts received in excess of that needed to complete this project will be placed in the Repair Reserve Account.

We are so grateful for the Trustees and custodial staff for taking such great care of our church building.
